Drowning	Paddlers following capsize and unable to self rescue.	Low - Moderate Shallow river generally no wider than 20 metres All Club boats have adequate buoyancy to float and support crew in the event of a capsize. Less experienced paddlers ranked below Division 7 and all under-12s required to wear buoyancy aids Paddlers are requested to render assistance to any person in difficulty on the water.	All but the most experienced paddlers will usually be wearing Buoyancy Aids – see the Buoyancy Aid Policy for details. Group Leaders will insist on obligatory use of buoyancy aids if weather/water conditions are deemed adverse or forecast to be adverse. First Aiders in attendance. Group Leaders will be made aware of any paddlers who had stated that they cannot swim 50m in canoe clothing.

Hypothermia	Paddlers effects of cold due to rain combined with wind chill and or immersion.	Low – Moderate - Dependent upon weather conditions The youngest and or inexperienced paddlers will be under the supervision of experienced Group Leaders and/or parents who will advise them on appropriate clothing.	New paddlers are given printed advice on suitable clothing. The group leader will ensure that all paddlers are wearing clothing suitable for the prevailing weather conditions. In cold weather, paddlers will return as soon as practicable to the clubhouse, where hot showers, dry clothing, and warm drinks will be available. First Aiders in attendance.
Sunburn/ Sunstroke	Paddlers being exposed to excessive sun without appropriate clothing and taking on insufficient fluids.	Low – Moderate - Dependent upon weather conditions The youngest and or inexperienced paddlers will be under the supervision of experienced Group Leaders and/or parents who will advise them on appropriate clothing and to hydrate prior to a paddling session.	The group leader will remind paddlers that they should be wearing sunscreen, hats and suitable clothing. For longer journeys in hot weather paddlers will be advised to carry drinking water. First Aiders in attendance.
Capsize	Junior or less experienced paddlers in windy or congested conditions	Moderate Inexperienced or novice paddlers are trained in capsize routines and self rescue. All paddlers are required to assist another paddler in difficulty.	Group leaders are required to remind paddlers of the Clubs Buoyancy Aid policy. Group Leaders risk assess weather and river conditions prior to paddling sessions to minimise risk to paddlers.
Collision with other river users	Paddlers and other river users – damage to boat or capsize.	Low Mostly experienced or inexperienced paddlers who will be supervised by experienced paddler(s), the group leader will advise paddlers to maintain adequate distance between each other's boats to prevent collision. All paddlers will be reminded to keep river right and avid oncoming or passing traffic.	All paddlers will be alerted by the group leader to the potential hazards presented by powered craft. Where possible oncoming skippers will be alerted to the presence of canoeists by the group leader. Where necessary the group leader will ask paddlers to move to the side of the river and hold station until the craft has passed.

Collision with natural hazards or river debris	Paddlers causing damage to boats or capsize	Low Mostly experienced or supervised by experienced paddler(s) All paddlers will have received a basic level of training on natural hazards	Group leaders will make forward observation of the river to ensure no trees or other hazards are causing an obstruction. Where practicable any obstructions will be removed. If it is not possible to remove any obstruction paddlers will be warned by the group leader of the position of the hazard. Paddlers will be advised to wear foot protection.
Swans	Paddlers resulting in capsize and or injury	Low – Moderate Aggressive behaviour is generally seasonal	Paddlers will be advised of any known swans resident or nesting in the vicinity of the day's trip, how to recognise aggressive behaviour and appropriate evasive action to be taken. A dynamic risk assessment will be made by group leaders based upon the circumstances encountered.
Trip hazards on towpath	Paddlers, Spectators and Walkers	Moderate There is sufficient BSCC land adjacent to the clubhouse for canoeists' equipment to be placed without impinging on the towpath	All paddlers and spectators will be reminded that the towpath is a right of way and must be kept clear at all times. Periodic checks will be made to ensure that no boats, paddles or other equipment are causing an obstruction.
Anglers	Paddlers entanglement and capsize.	Low Closed season on R Stort 15 March-15 June	If any anglers are fishing, paddlers will be warned and asked to ensure that they keep clear of the lines. All Club events to be advised in advance to the local Angling Societies to ensure there is no conflict over access to the river.
Waterborne disease	Paddlers, Spectators, Race staff and General public at risk of infections such as Leptospirosis (Weils) and E.coli	Low High level of awareness of Weil's disease in canoeing community, new members are advised of the risks at their initial visit. Showers & hand washing available in changing rooms	First aid kit and clean dressings are kept at the club house in the event of injury. All those attending the club will be reminded of the need for hygiene when taking part in water based activities. New members and guests are given written information about the disease and posters are prominently displayed at the club.
Lightning	Paddlers risk of lightning strike when holding carbon paddles over water	Low Weather forecasts are monitored prior Club sessions. Where lightning is forecast the on water time may be adjusted or cancelled.	In the event of lightning, the session will be brought to a close and the group leader will ensure all paddlers get off the water as soon as possible.

Injury from Lifting/Carrying Equipment	Paddlers	Low – Moderate Adults (parents/Members) will be available to move boats for young or inexperienced paddlers.	Group leaders will ensure that all new paddlers are alerted to the risks inherent in lifting and handling boats. They will also instruct new paddlers how to lift and carry their boats whilst minimising the risk of injury.
Canoes and equipment	Paddlers	Low Paddlers are advised to report all defects to their Group Leader and record any loss or damage in the Damage Book	Equipment owned by BSCC is regularly checked to ensure it is in safe condition. Any equipment not found to be safe will be taken out of service for repair or replacement.
Locks	Paddlers immersion in deep water	Low – Moderate Canoeists portage around locks rather than pass through. Inexperienced paddlers advised not to enter the locks to portage.	Experienced Paddlers only may enter the lock to disembark but must not enter the lock with powered craft.
Paddling in low light or after dark	Paddlers at risk of collision or capsize	Low – Moderate Experienced paddlers only on evening training sessions Powered craft do not operate after dark	Paddling after dark is recommended to take place only in structured training groups of 3 or more. Paddlers should not paddle alone.
Compound/Fitness room Doors	All from crush injury or entrapment	Low Keys for the doors and access controlled by a Group Leader	Doors will be hooked back when open to prevent injury.
Exercise equipment	All fitness room users	High risk of crush injury	The fitness room must not be used by under-18s except under the supervision of an approved person. The fitness room should not be used by anyone alone.
Road crossings	Paddlers from collision with moving vehicles	Moderate Road crossings are unmanned and all paddlers to be aware of approaching vehicles.	Paddlers will be made aware of the dangers crossing Pig Lane or Spellbrook.Lane Coaches will be reminded of their duty of care when escorting paddlers down river. Juniors are not permitted to travel below Pig Lane lock without the supervision of a coach

Injury from moving vehicles in the car park and access route	All	Low The grassed areas surrounding the clubhouse provide plenty of open space for people to congregate away from the car park	5mph speed limit whilst on lane and club site Traffic calming measure exist on the access lane All drivers reminded of the speed limit – signs clearly displayed
Toilets	All	Low	2 internal toilets provided at the club – 1 accessible to disabled visitors Disinfectant and anti-bacterial soap in the toilet areas
Catering	All	Low Hand washing facilities available on site and hand-sanitizer will be provided for those handling food.	Food preparation supervised by a member with a food hygiene certificate or is aware of food hygiene regulations. All food is stored and prepared in clean conditions Customers to be warned if being served hot drinks or food.
Barbecue	All at risk of food poisoning or burns	Low Fire extinguisher and fire blanket to be located at the BBQ.	BBQ strictly supervised all those not involved in food preparation kept away from the food preparation area. Hand-sanitizer will be provided for those handling food.

All juniors must be accompanied to the event by an adult who takes responsibility for them.

Low-High While Government Guidance is at Level 0 there are no restrictions on access to the Clubhouse and changing facilities, during the winter period it is considered that social distancing of 1Metre plus is good practice. Information about any changes in Government guidance and updates to the systems and protocols in place and what is expected of members and guests will be circulated by email and displayed in prominent signs on the premises.	All to be reminded of the current public health advice on living with COVID-19. Sanitiser stations to be available for Club sessions in the main club house. Notification of any changes of access to premises or facilities will be sent out to participating Clubs ahead of the date of such changes.
